A message from the Dean...

A fine event was held this month at Church of the Atonement in Westfield when they hosted the anthem-reading session with Paraclete Press. More than thirty singers showed up and we had a lovely pick-up choir with a fine balance in four parts. What a pleasure! I'd almost forgotten how lovely it is to sing with a real choir. Many felt the same way because choirs, like churches, have declined in the last 30 years. The Paraclete Press man, Jim, explained that the publisher has made a major shift in voicing to unison, two-part, and SAB anthems in order to meet the need. Many directors have found that choir members, especially the older ones, simply do not come to mid-week rehearsals anymore. What's happened to the joy of singing?

It's a shift in the entire culture and not a professional failure on your part. No one sings the national anthem any more either. They always hire someone or worse yet, play a recording. In my last years teaching at Westfield High, no one sang the school song or even knew the words. Thirty years ago it was the highlight of every football game. I heard Garrison Keillor bemoaning the fact on his weekly show where he regularly encourages the audience to sing. He noted that one of the last places in the culture where communal singing is encouraged is in churches. Many churches now print only the melody line, however, and congregations that used to sing in four-part harmony are increasingly hard to find. What can we do? It's up to us to keep singing alive! If you only have a choir of five women, so be it. Find exciting music for them to sing. If you or the clergy choose hymns, try to find the ones everyone likes

and play them with enthusiasm, varying verses and getting student instrumentalists involved. Introduce new hymns carefully and curb your desire to choose hymns or anthems that are beyond the reach of your audience. We are on the front lines of an art that is morphing from participation to passivity. Let's give it our every effort to stem the tide.... - **Martha**

Review: Organ Dedication and Concert - Ahlborn Galanti 2100

This event was held in honor of St. Martha Parish's 50th Anniversary and featured organist John Rose. The parish's Director of Music and AGO member Diana McConnell, began a search for the perfect organ last fall after receiving donations from several benefactors. She managed every detail of the purchase including the dedication concert. Benjamin Buckovitch who attends the church, opened the concert with two well-played pieces. He is only seven years old! Following acknowledgements and blessing of the organ by Administrator Fr. Daniel McElheron, Diana introduced John Rose. The program included pieces by Bach, Cesar Franck and Louis Vierne among others. He gave interesting commentaries throughout on the pieces played.

"Reflections of Southern Hymn Tunes" by Louie L. White for example, was written as a thank you for John's help accompanying Mr. White's choral group on short notice. This piece was played from White's original handwritten score. John showcased the new organ's realistic sounds throughout the program splendidly. - **Lori Bouret & Diana McConnell**

4 p.m.: Traditional evensong at St. James. Music by Ralph Vaughan Williams, Walter Pelz, and Will Macfarlane. After the service, AGO members are invited to visit and play St. James organ.

Patricia Kapitsky is presently the organist/choir director at Our Lady of the Hills RC church in Haydenville. Born in Schenectady, NY, she attended Pottsdam University and graduated as a music education major, later achieving a Master's degree in voice. She entered public school teaching at Marks Meadow Elementary school. A friend of hers attended UMass Amherst and when she came to visit her for a Halloween party, Pat met her future husband and migrated to western Massachusetts. She began her organ career as a funeral organist for Annunciation Church and studied with Janet Dahlberg. Although she was raised Catholic and remains so today,

Pat's father was Methodist, so she was quite comfortable taking a job as organist at United Methodist in Northampton. When the organist position at St. Mary's RC Church in Northampton opened, however, she took it and remained with that magnificent church for 13 years. You know the one...located on the right as you start up the hill to Smith College. Pat had to keep back the tears as she spoke of its closing and shook her head in disbelief that Smith College had not bought the property saying that it is currently up for sale. Patricia lives in Florence and has two grown children: Laura, a chemist living in Oakland, CA and Robert, a musician who gigs in the Northampton area.
