Dean's Message:

Happy new year to all!

I wish everyone best wishes for 2023 as we look back in the rearview at Christmas and Advent 2022 and forward to the new year 2023. We have so many carols, hymns and songs for Christmas and Hanukkah but what music is your favorite for New Year's celebrations? The obvious is the Scottish tune Auld Lang Syne which can be heard in the iconic movie "It's a Wonderful Life.

One of my favorite tunes to celebrate the New Year is by Benjamin Britten and is contained in his collection called "Friday Afternoons" written in 1936 for a Welsh school choir that met at that time. The text may refer to a ritual of washing that comes from Wales but may also refer to the Virgin Mary and images of the Holy Communion. Here is the text :

Here we bring new water from the well so clear, For to worship God with, this happy New Year. *Chorus (after each verse):*

Sing levy-dew, sing levy-dew, the water and the wine,

The seven bright gold wires and the bugles that do shine.

Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her toe; Open you the West Door and turn the Old Year go. Sing reign of Fair Maid, with gold upon her chin; Open you the East Door and let the New Year in. *Chorus (twice after each verse):*

Residue sing Residue, the water and the wine, Seven bright gold wires and the trumpets doth shine.

Other verses not set by Britten:

Here comes the maiden with gold on her toe; Open the West gate and let the Old Year go. Here comes the maiden with gold on her shoe; Open the South gate and let the New Year through. Here comes the maiden with gold on her chin; Open the East gate and let the New Year in. Here comes the maiden with gold in her eye; Open the North gate and let the Old Year by.

One of the absolute best things about living in the Pioneer Valley at Christmas time is the long list of concerts and quality music available for everyone to enjoy. There were so many that I had a hard time choosing. I have a niece that attends Northfield Mt. Herman, so i passed up Smith and Mt. Holvoke vespers (all at the same time) and was not disappointed at the magnificent chapel, the enormous dominating organ, the organist who loved playing it at full tilt, the student orchestra and the fine Choral program the school presented which included all traditions and congregational singing. During the ensuing weeks, i found myself at the Wilbraham Community Chorus winter concert at First Church in Longmeadow, and the Novi Cantori Concert held at the lovely little white church in Granville. The concerts were creative and varied with most making free will donations designated for favorite charities and non-profits. Best of all, however, was the welcome re-appearance of St. John's (Northampton) Messiah Sing after its absence due to the pandemic. Sickness is still very much around and the volunteer orchestra and chorus were sparser than in former times but those of us that were there had the thrill that comes with singing those beloved choruses and listening to professional soloists sing the arias. Director Allegra Martin had little sympathy for our amateur status and set heart pounding tempos, magnificently all held together by Grant Moss at the organ. It was an exhilarating event which raised money for Manna Community Kitchen. Be sure to dust off your Messiah score and put this event on your list for next year. You'll be very glad you did.

REQUIESCET IN PACE

With sorrow we announce the passing of Hedley Yost, a long time member of our chapter and active musician. His obituary is as follows:

Hedley E. Yost

Shelburne Falls, MA - On December 13, 2022, Hedley Yost, 87, died after a brief period of declining health, shortly after the death of his beloved partner Gordon Dean.

Hedley was born in York County, Pennsylvania, in Spring Grove. He was the youngest son of Emanuel Jacob and Helen Alverta (Beck) Yost and brother to Jay and Roberta.

Church music and the organ were Hedley's passion, and he had a rich and long career as organist and music director. He landed his first organist job at 15 and went on to earn both Bachelor's and Master's of Music degrees from Westminster Choir College where he studied with renowned organist Alexander McCurdy. He held positions at Stanford University, Morristown, NJ, and New York City. He often spoke of his time in Paris where he studied with Nadia Boulanger in the 1960s. Hedley's longest position was at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in New Canaan, CT, where he was organist and choir director for 25 years.

Hedley and Gordon moved to Buckland, MA in the late 90s. Although he maintained that he was retired, Hedley joined St. John's Episcopal Church in Ashfield, MA as Director of Music.

Hedley was a raconteur who wove travel, music, and people into fascinating tales. He was loved by his friends and organ students alike, and he had a rich social life. Hedley was not afraid to let you know how he felt. A favorite saying, particularly around cocktail hour was, "Water is not a drink!"

Hedley is survived by Gordon's children Allen Dean of Byfield, MA, Joy O'Connor and husband Bill of Londonderry, NH, Laurence Dean and wife, Karin Hammer-Williamson of Essex, VT, Evelyn Casey and husband John of Westfield, MA.
