

Review of John Anderson Concert

Christ the King-Epiphany, a small church in Wilbraham, recently hosted a dedicatory organ concert featuring John Anderson, former member of Springfield AGO who currently is serving a church in Manchester, CT. John spent many years in the Pioneer Valley not only as an organist but as bassoonist for 16 years with the Mt. Holyoke College Symphony Orchestra.

Like many of us in these times, Christ the King Lutheran has merged with Epiphany Episcopal, using the Lutheran Sanctuary but brought the Episcopal Organ...thus the dedicatory concert. It was a fun concert as John is an engaging performer, speaking with stories and humor before each of the diverse pieces he had chosen: Two contrasting Preludes and Fugues by Bach and Buxtehude, a modern elegy by James Biery, a sonata from Spain by José Lidon, a cute flute solo by Thomas Arne, an intermezzo on "Danny Boy" by Charles Stanford and a marvelous sonata by Charles Ore. The late Hedley E. Yost of our chapter will be remembered in an upcoming issue of The American Organist. His full obituary was printed earlier in the January Chiff Chat. An abridged version of his obituary is given below.

Hedley Yost, 87, died after a brief period of declining health, shortly after the death of his beloved partner Gordon Dean. He earned both Bachelor's and Master's of Music degrees from Westminster Choir College where he studied with renowned organist Alexander McCurdy. He held positions at Stanford University, Morristown, NJ, and New York City. Hedley's longest position was at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in New Canaan, CT, where he was organist and choir director for 25 years.


Hedley and Gordon moved to Buckland, MA in the late 90s.

Although he maintained that he was retired, Hedley joined St. John's Episcopal Church in Ashfield, MA as Director of Music.

Gail Archer to Perform in Springfield

Dear Friends,

Organist, conductor, and teacher <u>Gail Archer</u> has performed all over the world. Next Sunday. March 5th, 2023, she will be here in the Valley.

Prof. Archer will present a concert on the gallery organ at the Cathedral of St. Michael the Archangel in Springfield at 2:00 p.m. that day. The concert will be free and the public are invited.

The building at 254 State Street is the oldest Roman Catholic church building in Springfield. Built by immigrant families as a parish church in 1861, it has been the seat of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Springfield since 1870. It has three organs. Prof. Archer will perform on the gallery organ in the main sanctuary, This organ, built in 1929 by Casavant Frères, Ltée, was rebuilt in 1987. Details appear on the <u>Organ Historical Society Database</u>.

I spoke with Gail Archer two weeks ago. She was excited that her latest recording, "Cantius," had just received a favourable review in *The American Organist*, the magazine of The American Guild of Organists. "Cantius" CDs will be available at the concert in Springfield. The recording is named for the church in which it was made, St. John Cantius Church in Chicago. Northampton residents are familiar with the name: the former St. John Cantius Church here was also built by Polish immigants.

As a child, Gail sang in her father's church choir and was constantly exposed to organs and organ music. She began taking piano lessons at 8, but had to wait to start organ lessons until her legs were long enough to reach the pedals. Since then, she has earned a bachelor's degree in music education from Montclair State University, a masters degree in choral conducting from the Mannes College of Music and a doctorate in organ performance from the Manhattan School of Music. She holds an artist diploma in organ performance from Boston Conservatory.

For many years, Gail has toured in eastern Europe and has been performing the music of eastern European composers seldom heard in the United States. Next Sunday's "Concert for Peace" will include music by both Russian and Ukrainian composers. Here is the <u>program</u>. There will not be any Bach that afternoon, but you can hear her play some on <u>YouTube</u>.

Gail performed "Concert for Peace" last January at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City, where it was well received. Here is the review published by <u>Lucid Culture</u>.

Gail is Professor of Organ Performance at Barnard College of Columbia University, where she also directs the Barnard-Columbia Chorus and Chamber Choir. At Barnard, Pof. Archer teaches a year-long survey course in Western music. She is also an adjunct professor of organ at Vassar College, where she is the college organist.

In addition to her other activities, Gail is the founder and editor of <u>Musforum</u>, the on-line network for woman organists.

A large audience is expected for this concert, and it is sure to be successful musically. The organ at St. Michael's is in the rear gallery, so you might want to bring a mirror.
